Past or Future By Pastor Jeff Vanderhooft

I was in a meeting (no surprise there) a couple of months ago and a comment was made that resonated with me. "Churches in decline are in love with the past, growing churches are growing in love with the future."

Now, two things: one is that we need to know our past but we can't live there. Second is that the past is done, it's not where God is going, it's where he's been - we need to look to the future. So the comment has stuck with me. The reason I can't stop thinking about it is that it seems to be so true.

Our perspective, the direction we look, tends to color the way we perceive the world around us. As I recently said in a sermon about my perspective is that it has changed. I am better able to discern God's fingerprints over many aspects of life - especially our church life.

As I have learned to trust more in God and less in myself, I increasingly see God's fingerprints all over life. Paul writes that when he was child, he thought like a child. But when he grew up, he put childish ways behind him. (1Cor.13.11) As we grow older we know life

more fully; and we are faced with a choice. Seek the past, because there's comfort in what we know. Seek the future, which is uncertain, but it is where God is leading. Again, learn from the past, but we can't stay in the past. Our faith pushes us into the future.

Look at Abraham, his faith in God pushed him out of his comfort and all he knew into the unknown, including a land God would show him. When he left Ur of the Chaldees, God did not tell Abraham what the destination was, but that God would show him when they got there.

Which way are we looking? Backwards? Forwards? The past should be like a rearview mirror, the future should be like the windshield. We really want to see where we're going, but be aware of what's behind us.

Why are we scared of the future? Why do we cling so tightly to the past? To our accomplishments? To the way things were? The only thing that comes to my mind is that the past is comfortable. It's what we knew. It represents a form of security.

Let us remember that Jesus never promises either comfort or security. What he does promise is that he will never leave us nor forsake us. We are promised suffering - for the sake of the gospel. As odd as this sounds, let us embrace the future laid before us, without fear, without compromise and pursue God where he is and where he is leading.

Let us be the people who are salt and light in our community who bring the hope of the gospel with us wherever we go. Let us be the people that are asked about the reason for the hope within us. Let us be the people who are asked why we do what we do. Let us be the people who are constantly looking to see where God is at work. Let us be the people in the center of God's work, his kingdom activity. Let us be the people the gospel calls us to be - obedient.

- And we did a unit on "Learning the Lord's Prayer".



Prayer Corner



Many believers find that prayer, especially spending long amounts of time in prayer, can be one of the hardest parts of spiritual discipline. The Prayer Hand is an easy way to remember five essential aspects of prayer: confession, petition, intercession, thanksgiving and praise. Pray through each of these five purposes, using the Prayer Hand to walk through each. Remember that prayer is ultimately about aligning our own hearts with God's, and just as the fifth aspect explains below (illustrated by the thumb), praises to God should permeate every part of our prayer.



The little finger represents **confession**—I agree with God about my sin.
1 John 1:9—“If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.”

The ring finger represents **petition**—I ask God to provide for my needs.
1 Samuel 1:27—“I prayed for this child, and the Lord has granted me what I asked of him.”

The middle finger represents **intercession**—I ask God to provide for the needs of others.
Ephesians 6:18-19—“And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. Pray also for me, that whenever I speak, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel...”

The index finger represents **thanksgiving**—I thank God for what He has done in, through, and for me. I also thank Him for His answers to prayers in the lives of those around me and for His ongoing work across the nation and the world.
Ephesians 5:20—“...always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.”

The thumb represents **praise**—I let my enjoyment and adoration of God overflow into words. As the thumb is able to touch all four other fingers, so praise should permeate every part of my prayer life.
Psalm 146:1-2—“Praise the Lord. Praise the Lord, my soul. I will praise the Lord all my life; I will sing praise to my God as long as I live.”

Missions Update— United Campus Ministry/Joppa

This was my sixth year as the chaplain for United Campus Ministry. I cannot believe how much this ministry has grown. It started as buying a loaf of bread and some sandwich meat to serve students once per week. Then we were trying to get a few students to read their bibles and attend a study. It has turned into a few hundred students coming each week, and distributing more than one hundred and fifty bibles throughout the school year, and multiple studies and events during the week. It's really incredible.

The unique blessing of this ministry is that we will always have a new mission field. The challenge of this ministry is that the mission field is constantly transient. It's always on the move. Every two years, we have completely new students. We have one hundred percent turnover every two years. It's great, but always a challenge.

We're always looking for help in getting the students and the community connected. It seems like it should be easier than what it has been, but it's been a struggle. I appreciate that so many churches and individuals have been so supportive and has been involved out at the Center. These kids need those connections.

Our biggest outreach are the meals we serve twice per week. We served around ten thousand meals this year through that outreach. Every Tuesday and Wednesday, the Center fills with students, all coming for a variety of reasons. Some are hungry. Some are lonely. Some find incredible value in the discussions around the table. Some need attention. All of them get served and get loved.

The students each bring their own stories and hopes and dreams and struggles into our building. It's important that we hear them, help them and love them. They're made in an image, just like we are, and sometimes they need to be reminded of that, just like we all do. They need to know that God loves them.

There are hundreds of stories that could be told about this past school year. I'm going to share one photo on this letter that shows you the need. It's from a Ridge-water football game.

There were probably like 25 people in total there, no one south of the fifty yard line. These kids need support and community. It would be great if that came from the faith community.

Now, this isn't a recruitment to watch football. It is an invitation to get involved in the lives of people around us. One of the main things that students mention is that they wish they had more encouragement. I think we can do something about that.

Supporting United Campus Ministry is a great way to do that. Pray for more ways and more people to help out in this tremendous mission field.

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JOPPA

I've spent a lot of time in the past six years with United Campus Ministry, so sometimes I think that the other ministry I hold near to my heart is often overshadowed. I've been involved with Joppa for over 15 years. It's a young adult ministry under the Youth For Christ umbrella. The aim of this ministry has been to connect young adults with Christ and with each other.

There are many reasons why this is still important. Many young adults find themselves too old for youth group, or not "established enough" for traditional adult groups. Many of the young adults we see don't have a spouse, children, a mortgage... so they feel a little out of place with the people who do. Now this isn't to say one has to be single and renting to attend Joppa, it's just a partial reason why they're not typically engaged in these groups in churches. Our ministry is named after a port city in the bible because of the transient nature of the young adult. There are many choices being made in this time of life, and they impact destinations. We are here to provide a community to explore how faith is involved in guiding those decisions and the results of those decisions. (Cont. page



Missions Update– United Campus Ministry/Joppa

The photo on the right is probably my favorite picture of this summer. It's a group of young men praying after one of our summer sessions. There's something deeply encouraging to me when I hear the buzz of people praying for each other after we discuss a speaker or share a devotion on a Tuesday night. As these young men get to know each other, they pray for each other, as they pray for each other, they grow in community with each other more and more. It's a wonderful cycle.



Tuesday nights have that as one piece of what we do. Typically, in the summer months, we gather behind the Methodist Church in Willmar, play some lawn games, have a bonfire, and share a testimony. We'll sing some songs of worship, then we split into prayer groups. Dozens of young adults have been doing this all summer. Afterwards, it's not uncommon for about ten of us to go grab some appetizers and continue the discussion later. That's community.

During the fall through spring months, we meet inside at Harvest Church. We have a meal together. We have a guest speaker, or go through books of the bible together. We've been blessed to hear amazing stories and have incredible discussion each Tuesday night.

Sometimes it's hard to reach young adults. Joppa is a resource. If there are young adults in your congregation who are looking to get connected with others their own age and in their own stage, please use us as a resource.

Missions Update– Great Commission Utah

Greetings, Creekers is a term that Colorado City/Hildale residents call themselves. Kristin Evans is the wife Garreth Evans. They joined Brody and Liz a couple of years ago serving as full-time missionaries in Colorado City/Hildale.

The Evans are part of a closed Facebook group called, REACHING CREEKERS FOR CHRIST. Kristin is on another closed Facebook group of local Creekers. Amazingly she has been welcomed into the group.

One of the locals, last week wrote on Facebook asking for prayer for the people of her homeland, Greece. The wild fires in Greece have been very deadly. Seventy-four people have already died from the fires. She writes, "repent ye, repent ye, and embrace the everlasting covenant". She goes on to say, "if you are going to pray you must embrace the everlasting covenant." She apparently is very concerned that many of locals are no longer embracing the everlasting covenant and that if they don't change, the Lord will smite the whole earth with a curse.

By now you may be asking what is the "everlasting covenant"? This is the terminology they use for plural marriage. In a nut-

shell, this lady is saying that in order to turn God's anger away from the curse on the whole earth, the people of CC/H need to return to plural marriage and the world needs to turn to polygamy.

"He's the one who taught me carpentry," he said. "I wouldn't be in this business if it weren't for him. He spent a lot of time teaching me things he thought were important. Mom, I'll be there for the funeral," Jack said.

As busy as he was, he kept his word. Jack caught the next flight to his hometown. Mr. Belser's funeral was small and uneventful. He had no children of his own, and most of his relatives had passed away.

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


